A message from President Matthew B. Pagels



Nya:wëh sgë:nö',

I'm so happy for warmer weather. Summer is one of my favorite season's. I enjoy seeing everyone out walking, running and playing sports.

Many of the COVID protocols have been lifted in the surrounding areas giving everyone more opportunity to get out and about. At this time our 10 day snap shot shows nine positive individuals. Although this is a low number we must continue to stay vigilant and follow safety protocols. The Seneca Nation has updated the mask

requirements to allow fully vaccinated individuals at most Nation buildings the option to go MASK FREE.

Watch for mask signs at Seneca Gaming & Entertainment, AOA, One Stop and ECLC/Education establishments. Protocols for mask wearing will be determined by these departments.

We have some exciting news for this article. We celebrated the return of Red Jacket's Peace medal. Red Jacket is known as a prominent Seneca orator. He helped negotiate and sign the Treaty of Canandaigua, which pledged to respect, honor, and defend the rights of Haudenosaunee people. For this he was bestowed with the George Washington medal. (The Peace Medal-shown below- is displayed for viewing at the Onöhsagwë:de' Cultural Center in Salamanca.)

This medal represents much more than an honor of respect, it is a physical artifact from a pivotal point in our history. It represents the sovereign Nation to Nation relationship each and every Seneca rightfully acknowledges. It is our heart and spirit of us as sovereign people and our rightful recognition that is passed from generation to generation. We welcome the medal to be kept, honored and remembered

by the Seneca people. It reminds us of who we are, our identity and can be shared with others so they know our history, and culture.

Executive Order

Suspension of Mask Mandate for Fully Vaccinated Individuals

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT

The Seneca Nation mask requirements are now changed to the following:

- Fully vaccinated persons may go without a mask in most Nation's government buildings effective immediately (this includes fully vaccinated employees and visitors).
- "Fully vaccinated" means individuals who received a 2nd dose in a 2-dose series, or 1 dose of a 1-dose vaccination at least 2 weeks prior.
- If not fully vaccinated, you must continue to wear a mask in Nation government buildings.
- Temperature control screenings will continue at all entrances of SN buildings.
- Hand sanitizer stations will remain throughout SN buildings, and all staff and visitors should continue hand hygiene
- Employees and/or visitors may be asked to show proof of immunization, or be required to continue to wear a mask while in Seneca Nation government buildings.
- Exceptions to this Executive Order include the following departments or Nation entities which shall develop and post their own mask requirements which shall be no less stringent that the policy set forth in this Executive Order:
 - Seneca Nation Health System
 - Seneca One Stops
 - Seneca Gaming & Entertainment
 - Seneca Nation Elder programs and Seneca Nation Education Programs

Treasurer Armstrong gives remarks at the Buffalo Creek Seneca One Stop Official Opening

Greetings,

I'm glad we are finally enjoying some spring temperatures and easing into summer. Somehow, this pandemic has made it seem like our winter was even longer than usual. Perhaps because we really couldn't gather, as we would have liked to do. I'm so glad we are getting on the other side of this thing and slowly transitioning into a renewed outlook. Surely, everyone is looking forward to traveling and freely socializing again, since all of our lives have been impacted by these changes.

I see graduation season is upon us once again. Our Higher Education Department kicked off festivities for the season on May 20th. The ceremony commenced at the Seneca Iroquois National Museum, on Allegany Territory, with a drivethru dinner catered by Villagio, at the ACC. Our Seneca Training Center Construction Technology Program for Allegany, will hold their graduation ceremony

today, May 28th, at 11am at the Onöhsagwë:de' Cultural Center Amphitheater. June 4th, the Cattaraugus area high school graduate recognition event will be held at the CCC, with a takeout dinner catered by Fred's Catering of Fredonia. June 10th, the Allegany area high school graduate recognition event will be held at the Seneca Iroquois National Museum amphitheater, with a take-out dinner catered by Chiavetta's at the ACC. This last academic year had to have been very challenging for all of our graduates, due to the global pandemic. I hope each of you

realizes you have stayed the course and managed to work through what, at times, had to have looked like an insurmountable barrier. You did it and you can now look forward to the next step in your educational and vocational careers. The graduating classes of 2021 are truly history makers!

On Friday, May 21st, our fifth Seneca One Stop held their grand opening. The preliminary plans for the Buffalo Creek One Stop began during the fall of 2019 and we broke ground in September of 2020. The Buffalo Creek One Stop is a 4,800 square foot slab on grade, single story steel frame structure. It houses a convenience store, a drive-thru Dunkin' Donuts store and the fuel station has a total of 14 gas pumps. If you are in the Buffalo area, and running low, please stop in for some gas and check out your new store!

I would like to report, if you reside in New York State and are fifteen years of age or older, you should have received a package in the mail from the Seneca Nation by now. If you live on-territory or in the surrounding area, and received a refrigerator magnet containing important phone numbers, it was donated from the Seneca Nation Health System. I'd like to recognize my staff and all those who assisted with getting this task taken care of. We had help from the following departments: Deputy Clerk's Office, Human Resources, Disabilities, Museum, Library and Wastewater Management. Last, but not least, if it wasn't for the eleven employees from the Allegany Sanitation Department, this would have been a two or three day project! A heartfelt nya:wëh to Leona Lichy, her staff and everyone whom assisted my staff with this

mail-out!

I understand the state of New York is now reporting a positive vaccination rate of 70%. Also, per the CDC, vaccines have recently been approved for those aged 12-15 years of age. Please help to keep our communities as safe as possible by making an appointment and getting vaccinated.

REGISTRATION

There is approximately 355 adults and 141 children who have **NOT** completed their annual registration and must do so **by June 30**, **2021** to continue receiving benefits.

If you have any questions about the Annual In-Person Registration please feel free to call the Allegany or Cattaraugus Clerk's Office and we will be happy to assist you.

ANNUAL IN PERSON REGISTRATION EXTENSION DUE TO COVID-19

At the Regular Session of Council on January 9, 2021 Council approved a Resolution *Extending the In-Person Registration Requirement due to COVID-19*.

WHEREAS, the Seneca Nation Council established a general registration requirement for enrolled Nation members to qualify for annuity distribution; and

WHEREAS, the Seneca Nation's Council has since acted on several occasions to amend the in-person appearance and registration requirement; and,

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of public health and safety of the Nation and its members to extend the In-Person appearance registration requirement for the period of January 1, 2021 through June 30, 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic; and,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that all members who completed their 2019 & 2020 registration requirement, will be eligible to mail-in their completed registration form regardless if they are required to appear in person or mail in; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that effective January 1, 2021, members who did not meet the registration deadline of December 31, 2020 for the 2021 direct benefits distribution will be eligible for the January – June 2021 payment.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, this resolution will expire on July 1, 2021 and will revert back to Council Resolution R-02-11-17-06, accordingly, all members who have not registered by December 31, 2020 **must register by June 30, 2021** to continue receiving direct benefit payments for July 2021- December 2021.

• BURIAL FUND

A Burial fund has been designated to pay for funeral expenses up to \$7000 for enrolled members. For additional details, please contact the Clerk's Office during regular business hours.

• DIRECT DEPOSIT OF ANNUITY AND/OR ELDERS PAYMENTS

If you would like to sign up for Direct Deposit of your Annuity and/or Elders Check, you will have to complete the form. The form is available on the web at www.sni.org under Documents/ Clerk's Office / Direct Deposit forms or at the Clerk's Office.

- All direct deposit forms MUST have attached a voided check or deposit slip (start-up checks will NOT be accepted).
- Members must be at least 18 years old to sign up for Direct Deposit
- Minors are **NOT** eligible for Direct Deposit

If you receive direct deposit, it is your responsibility to keep your address updated with the Clerk's Office.

• RELEASE OF MINORS TRUST FUND

In order to begin receiving Minor Trust Fund disbursements. A member must be at least 18 years old and submit the following documentation:

- Application for Release of Minors Trust
- High School Diploma / GED

New Seneca One Stop Officially Opens In Downtown Buffalo

Gas station convenience store will operate from 6 a.m.-10 p.m. daily



BUFFALO CREEK TERRITORY, BUFFALO, N.Y. - With the unofficial start of the summer tourism and travel season just a week away, area motorists can now take advantage of the Seneca Nation's latest investment in downtown Buffalo to help meet their needs.

Nation officials gathered on the **Buffalo Creek Territory this** morning to celebrate the official opening of the new Seneca One Stop at the corner of Michigan Ave. and Perry Street, across from the Seneca Buffalo Creek Casino. The store features 14 gasoline pumps offering unleaded, mid-grade, premium, and diesel fuel, a 4,800 squarefoot convenience store with a variety of products, and a Dunkin' Donuts drive-thru. Seneca One Stop will be open daily from 6 a.m. – 10 p.m.

"We are thrilled to once again invest in our sovereign land to develop a project that will provide a needed and convenient service to our neighbors and visitors in Buffalo and Western New York," said Seneca Nation President Matthew Pagels. "We look forward to a long, successful history here on our Buffalo

Creek Territory." The \$5 million project expands the Nation's history of investment and job creation in Buffalo. The new Seneca

One Stop will initially employ 12 people at the store, and created approximately 100 construction period jobs over the course of the project. Beginning with the development of Seneca Buffalo Creek Casino in 2005, the Nation has now invested more than \$200 million on its Buffalo Creek Territory, creating thousands of local jobs and helping to transform the area

from its industrial past into a vibrant destination for visitors, residents and businesses.




"The change over the past 15 years has been dramatic and we are proud of the early and impactful role the Seneca Nation has played in that," President Pagels added. "Our investments and those that have followed have created a fabric of development and made this area into a hub of activity, not just a pass-through for people on their way into and out of downtown Buffalo."

The Nation has extensive experience owning and successfully operating energy stations through its Seneca One Stop enterprises. The One Stop brand has been a proud part of the Nation's economy for more than thirty years, beginning with the first travel plaza on the Allegany Territory in 1986, followed shortly by operations on the Cattaraugus Territory in 1988, the Oil Spring Territory in 1991, and the Niagara Falls Territory in 2016.

The Nation's business enterprises fuel its economy and are its primary source of funding for providing services to the Seneca people.

"As a government, we are responsible for providing for the welfare of our people," Seneca Nation Treasurer Rickey Armstrong, Sr. said. "In building and expanding our economy, which itself provides jobs, services and amenities in neighboring communities, we are able to create important pathways for the Seneca people. This includes pathways toward better healthcare, education, social services, housing, critical infrastructure, and, ultimately, a stronger quality of life."

News from SNI Utilities

Attention all waterline users on Cattaraugus Territory

Please note that during the month of June the SNI Waterline will be doing some routine maintenance to keep our waterlines working to their best capabilities.

We will be flushing lines in your vicinity on these dates:

- Zone I- Irving/Bucktown
 Area: June 8,2021
- Zone II- Mid Res: June 9, 2021
- Zone III- Eastern Res/ Ozarks & Indian Hill Etc: June 10, 2021

Water main flushing moves water systemically through sections of a drinking water distribution system, creating a scouring action to clean the line. The increased flow rate scours the water pipe's inner walls and helps to remove build-up of naturally occurring debris and sediment. The water is discharged through select fire hydrants onto local roads or other surface areas.

There may be a slight drop in pressure or noticeable discoloration of the water from the minerals and sediments that are being flushed out. In the event customers draw discolored water into the home, flush a cold tap for a few minutes, up to 15 minutes. During the flushing operation in your neighborhood, you will be able to see crews flushing the water mains through fire hydrants and ends of water main pipes commonly called blow-offs. To prepare, you may want to grab a pitcher of water to drink during this time but water is fine to use after.

This department's waterline was primarily funded

through the Indian Health Service and we must adhere to strict guidelines. Therefore, if you've had water service for one year or longer, it is up to you, as the homeowner, to maintain your hook-up. All renters should advise their landlords of their responsibilities if they are not being met.

Should any community members notice any standing water on your lawn, under your trailer (especially if it hasn't rained in awhile), please notify us immediately so we may identify the problem. Please note if you hear any water running in a home that is unoccupied, there may be a leak. THE WATERLINE **DEPARTMENT MUST BE INFORMED WHEN OCCUPANTS ARE LEAVING THEIR HOME FOR ANY LONG** PERIOD OF TIME SO WE MAY SHUT **OFF THE WATER** AND AVOID COSTLY **REPAIRS TO THE OWNER**. We appreciate any help our residents can

give us!

Also, please note that if you have to dig near any utilities you must contact DIGSAFELY at 800-962-7962. DIGSAFELY is an underground utility locating service. This could prevent you from accidentally ripping out dangerous electrical lines, natural gas lines and waterlines that could interrupt residential services. And, along this line, please note where you are tiling your gardens or having other doing it for you, septic lines and leach beds are not a good place to plant anything other than grass or flowers. Vegetables may not be safe to eat as home cleaning chemicals could be

leaching into these lines roots from deep planting or hardy growing plants could pierce the piping and clog the leaching process.

Also, please take note of the process that occurs when applicants apply for services from our department for wastewater facilities. We are funded through the Indian Health Service, so we do have to follow protocol and their guidelines. This process is not the fastest but working hand in hand with the agency will attempt to get all systems installed on a timely basis. At this time, there is a six month waiting period (at least) for new systems to be checked, site spec'd and designed and ready for construction. We do emphasize to our residents to be aware of when they decide to build or buy a home and to put their application in as early as possible. Sometimes people decide to build or buy a home and think that this infrastructure can just be placed in at their timeline but planning ahead is very important unless you are able to wrap it into your own costs, we are not to be used as a resource as priority level residents could come in at any time. These guidelines are available to residents. Stop by our office and pick up an application - the first two pages outline what is required. We appreciate an informed resident!

ELDER'S CORNER



Protecting Our Elders

June is Elder Abuse Awareness Month

Elders are an important part of our community. They are our first teachers. Their knowledge, language and experiences are passed down from generation through stories or by example. They share their pain,

triumphs and vision for the future. As community members, we must respect, honor and protect our elders from abuse and mistreatment.

Elder abuse is any knowing, intentional or negligent act by a caregiver or any other person that causes harm or a serious risk of harm to an elder. Sadly, the neglect and mistreatment of elders happens most by famliy members. Most cases of elder abuse are undetected, under-reported and unresolved.

Reasons elders hesitate to self-report abuse:

- Fear of retaliation
- Fear that no one else is going to take care of them
- · Shame of being abused
- Self-blame

Types of abuse:

- **Physical Abuse** The use of physical force that results in bodily injury or physical pain. Warning signs: Pain that is different. Unexplained signs of injury. Sudden change in function or mobility.
- Emotional/Psychological Abuse- Treatment of an elder in ways that cause emotional or psychological pain or distress, including intimidation through yelling or threats, humiliation and ridicule or isolating an elder from friends or activities. Warning signs: Frequent arguments or tension between the caregiver and elder. Changes in personality or behavior. Threatening, belittling or controlling caregiver behavior.
- **Sexual Abuse** Sexual contact that is forced, tricked, threatened or coerced upon an elder, including those who are unable to grant consent. Warning signs: Bruises around the breasts or genital areas and unexplained sexually transmitted diseases.

Financial abuse or exploitation- Theft, fraud, misuse or neglect of authority to gain control over an elder's assets. Warning signs: Sudden change in finances and accounts, altered wills and trusts, bills not paid or utilities turned off, unusual bank withdrawals, checks written as loans or gifts and loss of property.

• **Neglect**- Leaving an elder alone and/or denying basic physical, emotional or social needs like food, hygiene, medicine and companionship. Refusal or failure to fulfill any part of a person's obligations or duties to an elder. Warning signs: Unkempt clothes or hygiene, unusual weight loss, malnutrition, dehydration,

untreated physical problems such as bed sores.

Report Elder Abuse

Broadband Project NGRID and VZ "Make-Ready" Construction and Tree Clearing

The Seneca Nation's Council has authorized National Grid (NGRID) and Verizon (VZ) to complete "make-ready" construction and tree clearing throughout the Cattaraugus Territory. This construction is required to initiate the **broadband**, **high-speed Internet project**. Construction will begin in March / April 2021 and it will take a number of months to complete.

Broadband will bring <u>high-speed Internet and digital</u> <u>voice services to all Cattaraugus residents</u>. In order to accomplish this goal, we must contract with NGRID and VZ to

complete the required construction. Seneca Nation's broadband network construction will begin once these two entities have completed their respective work.

You will see NGRID and Verizon trucks on territory. We ask the community to be patient with the construction on territory since this is necessary to bring high-speed internet to the entire Cattaraugus community. We will provide updates throughout the project.

Chief Red Jacket Peace Medal Repatriation Ceremony

On May 17th, the Red Jacket peace medal was repatriated to the Seneca People in front of a crowd of 160 at the Onöhsagwë:de' Cultural Center on the Allegany Territory. The medal was previously in the care of the Buffalo History Museum.

Under NAGPRA (Native **Graves Protection and** Repatriation Act) § 3005(a) (5), the Nation requested the return of the Red Jacket Peace Medal as an object of cultural patrimony that has significant historical and ongoing cultural and traditional importance not only to our community but to all Seneca peoples.

The medal was gifted to Seneca Chief Red Jacket by **President George Washington** in 1792 to commemorate discussions that culminated in the Treaty of Canandaigua of 1794, in which the Seneca Nation served a crucial role. It was given as a symbol of peace, friendship and enduring relationships among the United States and the Six Nations. The Peace Medal stayed with Red Jacket for the remainder of his life and he reportedly wore it every day. Upon Red Jacket's death in 1833, the medal was passed down to his nephew, Jimmy Johnson. Johnson wanted to sell the artifact to what was then the New York





Museum in 1851, but the sale was intercepted by another descendant, Col. Ely Parker.

Parker also reportedly wore the medal frequently. He was well connected, though unable to fulfill his desire to practice law due to his Native heritage. As a result of his relationships, the medal came into contact with a number of high-profile individuals including President Abraham Lincoln, who was said to have held the medal the day before his assassination in April 1865. Parker kept the medal



until his death in 1895. It was subsequently sold to the Buffalo Historical Society (now the Buffalo History Museum) that same year. The Museum has served as a steward of the medal for the past 125 years and sustained popular interest in it, as well as in Red Jacket and all Seneca communities. Despite this laudable stewardship, the reality is that no individual can own an object of cultural patrimony. Though the Nation understands Ms. Parker's need for financial stability, it also believes she was not authorized

NAGPRA § 3001(3)(D) defines cultural patrimony as objects with ongoing cultural importance to a tribal nation, rather than property owned by an individual. The Red Jacket Peace Medal fits this description. As such, and pursuant to NAGPRA, the Red Jacket Peace Medal cannot belong to any individual or museum; it is inalienable and belongs to the Seneca People as a collective.

Like the Canandaigua Treaty, the Red Jacket Peace Medal is a representation of the ongoing sovereign relationship between the federal government and the Seneca Nation. Even though the Red Jacket Peace Medal has been out of our hands for many years, it has always maintained an inviolable place in our cultural memory.

We will continue our efforts to repatriate other important objects of cultural patrimony that rightfully belong with the Seneca People.

The Peace Medal is now being held at the Onöhsagwë:de' Cultural Center in Salamanca and is currently on display for public viewing.

Frozen Strawberry Yogurt



Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 0 minutes Total time: 10 minutes Number of Servings: 7 Serving size: 1/2 cup

Ingredients

- 4 cups frozen strawberries (unsweetened)
- 1 cup nonfat plain yogurt
- 3 Tablespoons sugar

Directions

- 1. Combine frozen strawberries, yogurt and sugar in a blender or food processor. Blend until creamy, about 2 to 4 minutes.
- Serve immediately or freeze in an airtight container or frozen treat molds for up to 1 month. Frozen leftovers will be very firm. Scrape into serving bowls with a spoon.






