

That committee produces such great events all year long. I understand golf tournaments are in full swing, right now. As for lacrosse, we have a good number of Senecas playing for the Lake Shore Eagles Varsity Boys Lacrosse team, which is overall undefeated at 11-0. New York State, which had possibly the highest rates of COVID-19 cases in the entire world, now has one of the lowest positivity rates in the U.S. As an incentive to get vaccinated, the State of New York is offering an opportunity to win a four-year college scholarship. REGISTRATION

There is approximately 266 adults and 110 children who have NOT completed their annual registration and must do so by June 30, 2021 to continue receiving benefits. This does not exempt you from the 2021 Registration year.

ANNUAL IN PERSON REGISTRATION EXTENSION DUE TO COVID - 19

At the Regular Session of Council on January 9, 2021 Council approved a Resolution Extending the In-Person Registration Requirement due to COVID-19.

WHEREAS, the Seneca Nation Council established a general registration requirement for enrolled Nation members to qualify for annuity distribution; and

WHEREAS, the Seneca Nation's Council has since acted on several occasions to amend the in-person appearance and registration requirement; and,

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of public health and safety of the Nation and its members to extend the In-Person appearance registration requirement for the period of January 1, 2021 through June 30, 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic; and,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that all members who completed their 2019 & 2020 registration requirement, will be eligible to mail-in their completed registration form regardless if they are required to appear in person or mail in; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that effective January 1, 2021, members who did not meet the registration deadline of December 31, 2020 for the 2021 direct benefits distribution will be eligible for the January – June 2021 payment.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, this resolution will expire on July 1, 2021 and will revert back to Council Resolution R-02-11-17-06, accordingly, all members who have not registered by December 31, 2020 must register by June 30, 2021 to continue receiving direct benefit payments for July 2021- December 2021.

If you would like to sign up for Direct Deposit of your Annuity and/ or Elders Check, you will have to complete the form. The form is available on the web at www.sni.org under Documents/Clerk's Office / Direct Deposit forms or at the Clerk's Office.

- All direct deposit forms MUST have attached a voided check or deposit slip (start-up checks will NOT be accepted).
- Members must be at least 18 years old to sign up for Direct Deposit
- Minors are **NOT** eligible for Direct Deposit

If you receive direct deposit, it is your responsibility to keep your address updated with the Clerk's Office.

Seneca Nation: State Must Reject Invenergy's Attempt To Develop Site Of Cultural, Spiritual & Historical Significance — Press Release

Solar Company's Effort to Ignore Concerns Cited by Nation, State Office of Parks, Recreation & Historical **Preservation Cites Previous Injustices and Cannot Stand** The Seneca Nation has called on the state Department of Public Service (DPS) to reject efforts by Invenergy to ignore concerns raised by both the Nation and the State Office of Parks, Recreation and History Preservation (OPRHP) and proceed with siting a significant solar project that threatens to destroy a landscape rich with Seneca, Haudenosaunee and American history.

Specifically, Invenergy noted in a June 14, 2021, letter to the state that is seeking to proceed with locating the Horseshoe Solar project on the site of the Canawaugus Reservation, despite the fact that OPRHP in a March 2, 2021, letter specifically stated its preference "for the avoidance and protection of cultural resources" and recommendation that portions of the project that overlap the Canawaugus site be eliminated.

Adding insult to injury, Invenergy is using as a rationale for its unconscionable effort an outdated recommendation by OPRHP to allow an invasive and harmful gravel mining operation on the Canawaugus Reservation. The Nation has repeatedly highlighted - and strenuously objected to – the fact that it was neither informed of nor involved the decision to allow that operation, which has caused significant damage to the site that can never be repaired or remediated.

Invenergy's argument that this site has already been damaged by previous aggressors does not justify its further impairment by the Horseshoe project, and to argue as such reflects a callous disregard on the part of the company for the importance of treaty lands granted to the Nation.

"The OPRHP's recommendation regarding the Horseshoe Solar project is clear, and it is critical that past injustices do not dictate future action by the state," Seneca Nation President Matthew B. Pagels said. "Invenergy's blatant disregard of the importance of treaty land to the Seneca Nation, as well as OPRHP's opinion on the matter demonstrates that the company does not, in fact, wish to be a partner or good corporate citizen, despite its claims to the contrary."

"Far too much damage to Indigenous lands, history and culture has been done to date, and the state in this case has the opportunity to do the right thing," Pagels continued. "Protecting the Canawaugus Reservation will not undo decades of mistreatment and disinvestment that the Nation has suffered, but it will send a message that a new day has dawned, and the rights and desires of Native people are finally being taken into consideration and recognized."

The Nation joins OPRHP in requesting that portions of the Horseshoe Solar project located within the Canawaugus Reservation be immediately removed from inclusion in the plan. If allowed to proceed, this project will only continue a pattern of historical destruction to this historically sacred land – an outcome that will not be tolerated by the Seneca people.

Indigenous communities taking the lead on climate change adaptation

The effects of climate change have been ramping up for decades. We are currently seeing this as: a steadily warming planet, severe and unpredictable weather events, droughts and wildfires, and rising sea levels. While these changes affect the entire planet, indigenous peoples are expected to be one of the most vulnerable groups in North America. Indigenous communities have relied on the land for generations and have extensive knowledge of the natural cycles in their local ecosystems. However, climate change disrupts these natural systems and threatens sacred lands, wildlife, and medicines. On the bright side, indigenous communities across North America are developing climate action plans to protect their way of life.

Tulalip peoples in California have relocated beavers from urban areas back to their natural habitat in order to lower river temperatures and strengthen salmon populations. The Salish and Kootenai in Montana are gathering and planting whitebark pine saplings that are naturally resistant to climate-related diseases. Alaskan communities are developing scientific methods to identify and contend with harmful algal blooms polluting their now-warmer waters. The Karuk of

northern California have returned to the longstanding method of prescribed burning to control wildfires in their adaptation plan. The Swinomish of Washington State have gained some attention with their climate adaptation plan as well. They have seen their salmon population crash over the last 30 years and the shellfish they rely on are literally dissolving due to ocean acidification. In order to combat these issues they have developed innovative solutions such as planting trees along rivers to lower temperatures, building clam gardens, blocking mining operations, and bringing in truckloads of oyster shells to act as new homes for threatened native oysters they have imported. Programs like the ones above can have a marked effect on the environment and may help conserve important resources for generations to come.

The Seneca Nation has committed to combating the effects of climate change on our area. In 2020 the Climate Change Taskforce (CCTF)* was created to increase understanding about tribal adaptation and mitigation planning in preparing for the impacts of climate change and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. This includes consideration of traditional knowledge in

understanding climate change impacts and identifying culturally appropriate strategies to address them. In collaboration with University of Buffalo, the Nation has taken on two interns to gather information, identify hazards, and draft a Seneca Nation Climate Adaptation Plan. Stay tuned for updates from the CCTF and information regarding climate change and sustainability.

Update on Gypsy Moths

The Environmental Protection Department has seen a recent uptick in messages about gypsy moths, so we would like to give the community an update and provide some useful information.

Aerial spraying for these invasive pests has been conducted in the past, but will not occur this season. Due to the low availability of the proper pesticides and the current stage of larvae, it appears that widespread spraying would be impractical and ineffective.

The moth's larva stage (caterpillars) will be concluding at the end of the June or early July, when they enter the pupal stage. During this stage they will be encased in a dark brown shell for one to two weeks. When the adult moths emerge they do not feed and will only live for about two weeks while they breed and lay eggs. Before they enter this pupal stage, caterpillars can be controlled with the following methods:

- •Tree banding: Using tape and other sticky substances to prevent larvae from climbing trees.
- •Manual removal: Wearing gloves, physically remove caterpillars from the tree and then drop them into soapy water or destroy them by other means.
- •Pesticide: Bacillus thuringiensis var. kurstaki (BTK) products are natural pesticides which only target caterpillar populations, but must be ingested by the larvae to be effective; so the product must be sprayed on foliage.

Gypsy moth outbreaks are difficult to predict and control once they have begun, so we will continue to monitor trends and adapt to prevent future outbreaks. Gypsy moth caterpillars defoliating forests across New York

Gypsy moth caterpillar Leaf-chewing gypsy moth caterpillars have been reported throughout New York state this spring.



A state Department of Environmental Conservation forester said Wednesday that many forests across the state are being defoliated by invasive gypsy moth caterpillars.

In a Zoom meeting with reporters, forester Rob Cole said gypsy moth caterpillar damage has been reported in Western New York. Some defoliation has been reported locally in oak trees along the Allegheny River Valley Trail.

Joseph Snyder, a timber buyer for Fitzpatrick & Weller Co. of Ellicottville, said there appear to be more gypsy moth caterpillars around the county than in 2020, but he has seen no major defoliations this year.

Cole said gypsy moth caterpillars are hitting Clinton, Saratoga, Warren, Ontario, Orleans and Livingston counties the hardest.

The defoliation in parts of the Adirondacks is unusual because they had not been reported in those areas last year, Cole told reporters.

The caterpillars favor oak trees, aspen and willows, but can also eat the foliage of alternate hosts like blue spruce, white pine, maples and hemlock trees.

Cole said in most cases, the trees will refoliate in July, although successive years of defoliation can kill trees. If blue spruce and white pine are completely defoliated, they can die.

The acorns in oak trees — which many animals depend on for food — are not eaten by the caterpillars and should continue to grow, but possibly in reduced numbers, Cole explained.

Damage from the gypsy moth caterpillars to trees effectively ends after three years when the populations succumb to virus and fungus, Cole said. These are natural enemies that have evolved since the caterpillars escaped from captivity in Massachusetts in the mid-1880s where they had been imported from Europe to make silk.

There is also a commercial product available, BT, a biologic that targets the caterpillar larvae, Cole said. The time for this application has about closed, however, because it is less effective as the caterpillars grow larger. They can grow to about 2 1/2 inches. Some forestry companies that own

large tracts of property in the gypsy moth caterpillars' path will contract for aerial spraying.

For homeowners hoping to save their ornamental trees from the voracious gypsy moth caterpillars, the same BT can be successfully applied to trees in early spring as the tiny caterpillars emerge, Cole said.

Another method of protecting individual trees is to apply a belt of a sticky substance around the tree trunk. Do not apply it directly to the tree, Cole warned. The caterpillars climb up and down the tree trunk and will become stuck to the substance.

In late June, when the caterpillars pupate to become adults, Cole advised homeowners to place a burlap bag around the base of the tree. The caterpillars will go into the burlap, where they can be collected.

Another way to reduce the gypsy moth caterpillar population the following year is to hunt for the light brownish egg masses they lay on houses, trees, fences, furniture and other outdoor surfaces. Scrape them off and drop the egg mass in water, he suggested.

Zed Williams: Success Rooted in Family

There is plenty to say about Zed Williams these days and by and large, he hears it. All the talk about his elite level of play and how he's one of the best lacrosse players in the world.

He also sees the way people look. The adoring eyes of young players, the menacing glare of peers trying to defend him and the often-dejected stature of those who cannot.

But that's not the way Williams sees or even thinks of himself. Sure, he's confident in his lacrosse abilities and he knows he can run with the best. But the primary goal is, and always will be, to make his family proud.

And if being the best lacrosse player in the world is a byproduct of that mission, then so be it.

Because in his mind, at home is where it all started.

"My brothers and I were always playing sports," he said of his youth in Irving, N.Y. with five brothers and two sisters. "I usually came out of there crying because they didn't take it light on me but I'm so appreciative of that.

"We had a lot of fights, but that made me tougher, and I was never afraid to put my body on the line because I wasn't afraid."

With all due respect to coaches and trainers who may run the most regimented practices on the planet, there is plenty of credit to give to backyard lacrosse when the topic is athletic development. And considering where Williams is today on the short list of elite talent, the lessons of informal lacrosse played no small part.

But the drive and the ethic that powered Williams in last summer's Premier Lacrosse League championship game as MVP with the Whipsnakes comes from more than lacrosse. It's rooted deeply in a sense of family that may not have been in the lap of luxury in Irving, but it most certainly was focused on having the proverbial back of each other.

"My dad was big on manual

labor. We had property so we had to take care of it," he said. "We didn't have a riding mower until I was in high school, so we used a push mower to cut all that grass and I think about that. I complained about him making me do all those things, but that's what he instilled in me. No matter what, get the job done."

So whether it was his late father Dan pushing the labor button or siblings like older brother Zack showing the importance of grades in school, Zed Williams knows about work. And he knows there are no shortcuts.

Beyond the blood relatives, the setting of a small district like Silver Creek schools helped forge bonds and playing football, basketball and lacrosse is what drew Williams to his coaches.

Specifically, Rob Genco, who taught elementary physical education for Williams and coached him at various levels of high school sports.

"At such a small school, certain kids would cling to me and wherever I was, Zed wanted to be there," Genco said of the young Williams. "As a mentor to a lot of kids, you never know what's going to stick but I always emphasized being a good human being."

Apparently, that message did stick with Williams and a 2013 Buffalo News article offers an example from his senior year of high school.

An opposing basketball coach told the story of seeing Williams come off the basketball bus to prepare for a game and as he walked into the gym, he stopped to pick up a crushed can on the sidewalk to throw it away.

"He'd see me do it at (lacrosse) games, even road games and he asked me why are you cleaning up other people's garbage?" said Genco. "And I told him it's the right thing to do. He got it, because the next thing I know he's picking up garbage, even at away games. It's always about being a good person."

Eight years later, the lessons from Genco continue to resonate.

"That dude, when he'd put his arm around me to talk, he always had the best interest for me and my brother (Zack)," said Williams. "His affect on my life ... he was really compassionate, and I always listened to him. He always told me to think for myself."

Dom Starsia was the coach who recruited Williams to Virginia, and he knew he had something different in this midfielder who was so shy off the field, he would rarely even look up.

"Everything is rooted in family for him," said Starsia. "He gets his moral authority from his family and he sees what he's done in his life as a public statement for the Williams family."

So tight is that family bond that Starsia sometimes wondered if Williams would come back to campus following breaks. And his habit of showing up at the last minute for meetings or practices didn't do much to ease Starsia's worries.

But as usual, Williams came through.

Even off the field, when the academic rigors of college called for assistance in the classroom, Williams embraced the challenge.

"He was determined to make it work," said Starsia. "He was going to take care of business and it wasn't for a lack of effort. There was just so much ground to cover ... but he turned the corner. You could see the determination."

And yet again, it's the work ethic instilled by his family that pushed Williams on campus.

"I never doubted I could do college but at the same time, everything was so new to me," said Williams. "I was away from home in a new atmosphere ... I didn't know how it was going to work out but I knew I was not going to quit."

Starsia understands that as the first Williams to graduate college, the UVA impact is big. But the retired coach is as quick as a split dodge to change direction because his relationship with Williams went beyond the game.

"When you show your vulnerabilities, that's when relationships flourish," he says. "When I visited him at his house, we went for a walk and he opened right up about things. He was somebody I could talk to ... He brings it all together with honesty, sincerity and vulnerability and he's willing to share it with you."

Maybe that's why Starsia said that as much as he and the UVA experience had a positive impact on Williams, the reverse is true.

"I was at High Point a couple of years ago to visit with the team there," said Starsia. "And one of the kids asked me what was the highlight of my coaching life. The victories are the obvious answer but being at Zed Williams's graduation was as big a moment in my career as anything else."

And when Williams made sure to include Starsia's twin daughters on the invitation list for his recent wedding, it didn't prove much beyond what Starsia already knew.

"This kid is a special person," he said. "His influence on my life

and my family ... it's been a joy to get to know him better and see how he is with his family and the loyalty there."

Jim Stagnitta had an idea of the player the Whipsnakes were getting in Williams. The coach watched him play at Virginia and saw his work with the Boston Cannons.

The continued improvement he witnessed in Williams is a big reason he was excited to welcome him to the PLL's Whipsnakes, but an emphasis on chemistry and culture is what helped Williams reach the level he did last summer.

"Just having the opportunity to play on a team and in a system that allows him to play to his strengths and be creative was key," said Stagnitta. "It allowed him to do specific things, to go out and play with other guys who not only complement what he's doing but he can complement what they do too."

The physical tools are there, said Stagnitta, and he has no doubt that part of Williams will continue its trajectory. That's why the intangible part of the equation, finding comfort in his role, became so important. Even more, Williams accepts it and responds.

"It's come with age and it's come with experience," said Stagnitta. "He's one of those guys where if he's comfortable with you, you can push him and he will respond. He puts lessons into action and he's still trying to figure things out that were part of him when he was younger ... and put them into perspective so he can develop and evolve."

So many know Zed Williams the lacrosse player, and Williams gets that. And for as much as he loves the game, he was taught to respect it and be mindful of what it's done for him.

That lesson also came from his family and it's why he's so insistent on giving back.

Whether it's as a volunteer assistant coach at St. Joseph's Collegiate Institute in Buffalo, home in Irving with young children looking up to him, working as a mentor at Silver Creek or with fans after a professional game, Williams says he always has time.

"I just try to make people feel comfortable," said Williams. "I see lacrosse kids and I go up to them and have a conversation. I remember being a kid and I was shy. I didn't know how to create a conversation so now I just go up to kids and start talking with them, asking them about their sticks and gear."

None of this surprises Genco.

"The winning was a bonus with Zed," he says. "But it never would have happened had the relationship not been so special. I told him the Creator blessed him with ability ... but with that gift comes responsibility."

Like Genco said before, Williams gets it. He understands the balance that comes with being a superstar on the field and an even brighter leader off of it.

"I'm just another dude," says Williams. "I play the game to win championships, I want to be the best and I want to make my family proud and happy but at the end of the day, that's over. That's last year. What am I going to do to be better?"

Quite frankly, a better Zed Williams scares Genco. He doesn't come right out to say he predicted the greatness the world saw in Williams last summer, but again, he wasn't surprised.

Not when Williams mentioned before the PLL season that Whipsnakes teammate Matt Rambo helped welcome him to the clubhouse and told him he had the green light.

"I said look out," recalls Genco.
"I pretty much knew what was coming. This is what we've all been waiting for."

And with a workout routine that's added about 20 pounds to his 6-foot-2 frame, 2021 has the potential for even more. But no matter how good he is at lacrosse, the goal for Williams is to be even better at life.

"I preach the same thing," he says of his work with young players. "Be a good person. Be kind. No matter what the situation, I preach the same thing. That's what's most important."

June is National Men's Health Month

Most men need to pay more attention to their health. Compared to women, men are more likely to smoke, drink alcohol, make unhealthy or risky choices, and put off regular checkups and medical care.

Men, how can you take charge of your health? First of all, see a doctor for regular checkups even if you feel fine. This is important because some diseases don't have symptoms at first. You can also take care of your health by getting important screening tests and make sure you are up to date on recommended immunizations.

Get your blood pressure and cholesterol checked. If you're over 50, you should get checked for colorectal cancer. If you feel stressed, anxious, or depressed for more than 2 weeks, talk with your doctor about a screening for depression. These screenings can find diseases early, when they are easier to treat.

It's important for men (and women) to understand their family health history. Don't be embarrassed to talk about your health. Start talking to family members to find out which diseases run in your family. Share this information with your doctor.

It's not too late to start healthier habits. Make eating healthy and getting physically active part of your daily routine. A healthy diet and regular exercise can help lower your blood pressure, blood sugar, cholesterol and weight. By keeping these numbers down, you can lower your risk of serious health problems like diabetes and heart disease.

You can also help prevent health problems by quitting smoking and limiting your alcohol consumption.

Make small changes every day. Small changes can add up to big results. Take a walk instead of having a cigarette, try a salad instead of fries, drink water instead of soda or juice and lower your salt intake.

Take action to be healthy and safe and encourage other men and boys in your life to make their health a priority.

The hills depicted in the background represent the Seneca people. In our language we refer to ourselves as 'People of the Great Hills.'

The young ones sitting with an Elder will be our starting point because their minds are at the best stage for language learning.

The Elder advises the youth, "Learning is lifelong, it is never-ending" and she is doing her part by teaching others with the hope that one day they will do the same.

The group sitting in a circle represents our vision that they will become like family, help each other learn, and that one day, they will use our language as their first. The fire represents our commitment as a people to protect it and keep it burning bright for the children and their children; the fire can never go out.

The Circle that encompasses the entire logo represents all that we are as a people and is a reminder to live our lives using our language and perpetuating our life ways.
