### CA message from President Matthew B. Pagels



#### Gagwe:gö sgë:nö', agajëgwah gagwe:göh jöhiyoa:je',

I hope everyone was able to get out and enjoy the Seneca Fall Festival. It felt good to be able to walk around and see people for a brief conversation. We asked everyone to mask up, sanitize and social distance to keep the spread of COVID down. As you can see from our numbers we continue to see our positive cases rise on both Territories. It is going to take each and everyone to do their part in slowing down

the progression of this virus.

Although we are seeing breakthrough cases of those who have been vaccinated, symptoms should be milder. The CDC and other health organizations predicted that break through cases would still occur and be spread the same way. This is why it is as important to continue to follow COVID – 19 protocol to protect you and your family. The best defense against the virus is to get your COVID vaccine.

The data shows our lowest vaccination rate is among people under 40 years old. Please, for the safety of the community, get your vaccination as soon as possible. As always, please contact the Seneca Nation Health System for vaccination information or complete the online form at SenecaHealth. org/vaccine to schedule an appointment.

The Nation has started pop up Bluestone testing again on a weekly basis. Starting September 16th testing will be held every Thursday through October 14th at both



Allegany and Cattaraugus Fire halls from 1pm -5pm Testing helps keep the community informed of their health status and helps to keep the virus isolated when infected. If you are tested you must remain in quarantine until you receive your results. We will also have a PPE distribution on Thursday, September 30th at the CCC and ACC.

I'd like to share a few sentiments I gave during the recent 911 remembrance at Iroquois Post 1587. "For those who are old enough to remember this day, will always remember where we were when we first heard about what was happening.

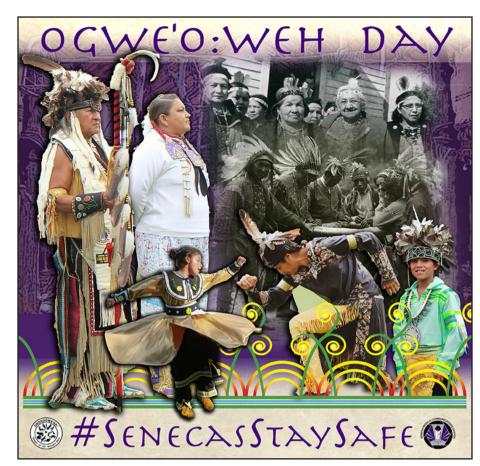

#### Greetings,

I see the leaves are beginning to change color, our days are gradually getting a little shorter and the evenings are cooler. If you attended the Fall Festival on Cattaraugus Territory, I hope you enjoyed seeing old friends and were able to catch the Smoke Dance Contest at the Sachems field. I hear the dancers really enjoyed dancing outdoors!

The Salamanca Warriors Varsity Football has had some very exciting wins, recently.

Their game against Southwestern had a scoreless first half; and in the final push, a young Seneca athlete and backup quarterback, Maddox Isaac, stepped up and answered the call! He threw the winning pass with thirteen seconds left on the clock, for a 14-13 win. Maddox, a ninth grade freshman, had to fill in for Hayden Hoag, who had gone down with a knee injury. In their next game, against Allegany-Limestone, Maddox was able to read the field, found open receivers and threw three touchdown passes for 201 yards. Way to step up Maddox - great athletic ability! It's always exciting to see our own rise to the top.

I'd also like to send out a big congratulations to the Marksmen for their win in the 2021 Interstate Box Lacrosse Association National Championship, held in Lakeland, Florida. They had an undefeated season and went on to win the championship, with the "cream of the crop" playing together. It's always so good to hear about our Seneca lacrosse champs!

As anticipated, the FY 2022 Budget was approved at the September 18th, Council Meeting, in Allegany. We have a roster of employees from various departments whom will be recalled to begin working, effective October 4th, 2021. In addition to approving the budget, Council approved resolutions which created charters to change Seneca Gaming & Entertainment and our Seneca One Stops from nation departments to limited liability corporations (LLC). Our Fiscal Department has been assisting the finance team at the Seneca Nation Housing Authority transition into a department of the nation, effective October 1st, 2021. These are some of the major projects which our Fiscal staff has been busy with, the past several months. Couple those with pushing out additional member benefits from federal ARPA funds and several other demanding projects. I'd like once again commend all of our Fiscal staff for continually performing their duties with accuracy, integrity, and timeliness. Keep up the great work!

Our communities continue to have an increase in cases of COVID-19. I can't stress it enough how important it is that we remain vigilant and keep our guard up. Please, if you are presently not vaccinated, consider getting your COVID-19 immunization shot(s) as soon as humanly possible.

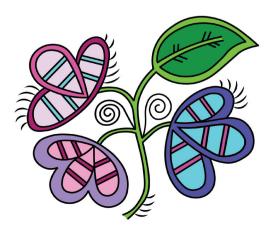

The Seneca Nation of Indians is seeking interested individuals to submit their qualifications to serve as a member of the Management Committee of Seneca Holdings, LLC. The company's Management Committee currently has **one** seat up for appointment.

#### Matthew Pagels President, Seneca Nation of Indians

When Matthew Pagels won election to the presidency of the Seneca Nation of Indians last year, he became an integral part of its work toward a new casino compact with the state just as it reached a critical juncture. With the current agreement expiring in 2023, Pagels will need to negotiate with state officials on a compromise to keep the Seneca's casinos, which have brought in more than \$1.5 billion over the past two decades, running smoothly.

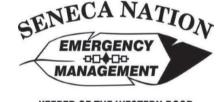

#### **COVID-19 Diagnostic Testing**

The Seneca Nation still is offering COVID-19 diagnostic testing to individuals and employees of the Seneca Nation. Testing is open to anyone who would like to be tested. You DO NOT need to have COVID-19 like symptoms to be tested.

#### **Location:**

When: Testing is by request to set a date and time

How: Call Emergency Management at (716) 532-8178 (business hours) or (716) 244-0820 (after hours) or Seneca EMS at (716) 532-8550 (business hours) or (716) 574-2007 (after hours)

PRE-REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED. You must register for a test.

Those without registration completed will not be accommodated at the test site and cannot be tested!

#### How to Register for COVID-19 Testing:

- Register online at Bluestonesafe.com
- Client code: senecagov and User code: 3030
- You must register prior to the testing date
- Please bring your phone with you to the testing site to access your registration link

#### What to Expect on the Day of your Test:

- DO NOT eat or drink anything one hour prior to the testing
- Please arrive no more than 5 minutes prior to your scheduled time

- Please remain in your vehicle and follow the directions of staff at the testing site
- Testing is conducted while you are in your vehicle
- Testing is conducted via saliva sample and only takes a few minutes to complete
- You can expect the results of your test in 2-3 days; by text message, email or phone call
- You should self isolate after testing until results comeback negative, to resume normal activity

Note: This saliva sample PCR test will determine if someone is currently infected with the COVID-19 virus.



### **COVID-19 Delta Variant: What Community Members Need to Know**

COVID-19 cases are rising in some tribal communities due to the new strain of the virus called the Delta variant. This fact sheet summarizes what you need to know to stay safe from Delta:

- •The Delta variant spreads much more easily and quickly than previous strains of the virus.
- •Unvaccinated people are at high risk of getting sick from Delta.
- •People who have been fully vaccinated are well protected against severe disease from Delta.
- •Delta is just one strain of COVID-19. The virus will continue to change and make new strains as it spreads from person to person.
- •Vaccines are highly effective against all known strains of the virus. Get vaccinated today to protect yourself, your family, and your community against new strains of COVID-19.

#### How contagious is the Delta variant?

The Delta variant is much more contagious and spreads much faster than earlier

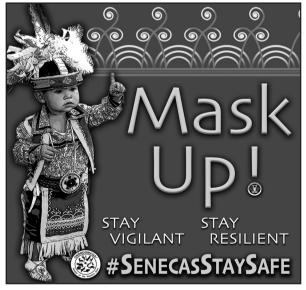
strains of the virus. The Delta variant has spread rapidly in the US. In June, Delta was responsible for just 10% of all cases of COVID-19 in the US. That number jumped to 50% in July. Increasing rates of infection show that Delta is highly contagious.

#### How effective are vaccines against the Delta variant?

All 3 available vaccines are highly effective against the Delta variant. Recent studies have shown all 3 vaccines provide significant protection against illness, hospitalization, and death from Delta. Vaccination is the best way to protect you and your family from Delta.

#### Am I at risk of getting sick from the Delta variant?

People who have not been vaccinated are at very high risk of getting sick from Delta. Fully vaccinated people are at very low risk of getting sick from Delta. Masks help prevent the spread of variants. People who are not fully vaccinated should wear a mask in indoor public places and crowded

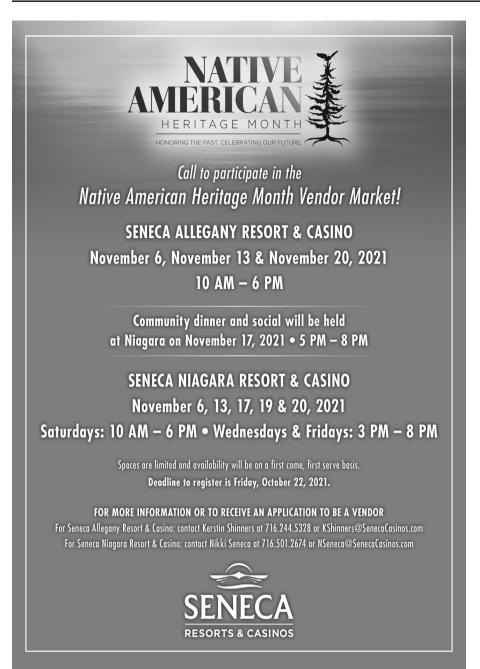


outdoor settings.

#### What is the Delta Plus variant and should I be concerned?

The Delta Plus variant is a new strain of COVID-19 that was first discovered in April. It is unknown whether it is more contagious than the previous Delta variant. The best way to protect yourself against all strains is to get vaccinated.

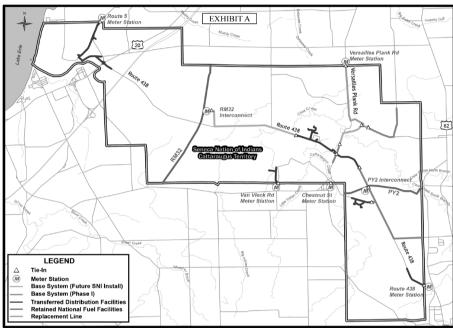


**Natural Gas Map**

During July's Council, the Seneca Nation approved the repair and expansion of the natural gas distribution system on the Cattaraugus Territory. The below map depicts the areas where natural gas lines exist or will exist once the project has been completed. Some residents will require a new service line and other residents will gain access to cheaper, more reliable natural gas. Construction will begin this summer and continue through June 2022.

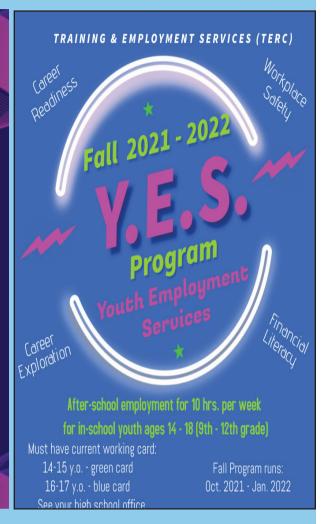

#### **Every Child Matters Exhibition to open at Sully Huff Heritage Center**

In the wake of the 215 unmarked graves discovered at the Kamloops Residential School in BC, Canada local artist Hayden Haynes was inspired to carve earrings from deer antler to pay homage to the children that never made it home.

Producing the earrings prompted a photo shoot in an effort to raise awareness about the Thomas Indian School, the Indian Boarding School on Seneca Territory that operated from 1855 to 1956 under the federal policy of forced assimilation. Haynes partnered with Jocelyn Jones on the shoot having her model the earrings at one of the former Thomas Indian School structures. Haynes wanted to be able to tell a slight portion of the history to share information with community residents that are unaware.

After posting the photos to social media, multiple individuals across Turtle Island reached out to Haynes with ideas to spread awareness further. He decided to build off the photos and initiated the traveling exhibition "Every Child Matters" in hopes to continue to educate our community with history, visuals and art from Indigenous community members and academics.

Haynes wants to tell our story from our perspective through Hodinöshö:ni academics and artists who are also community members and relatives of victims and survivors. His main priority is to educate our community with our own voices to tell our own stories. "This project was put together by the minds and hands of Hodinöshö:ni people so it's a way to reclaim that narrative sovereignty- which they are fully capable of doing. That's why it's important for the exhibition to travel so we can continue to perpetuate our own narratives, shares Haynes."

The William Seneca Building and many Seneca Nation structures now occupy the former boarding school site on the Cattaraugus Territory.

The Seneca Nation Judicial branch currently occupies the former infirmary building. Most structures are condemned but still standing around Seneca Nation facilities in Irving, NY.

Dr. Lori Quigley (Seneca), Dr. Alyssa Mt. Pleasant (Tuscarora), Dr. Rodney Haring (Seneca) and Dr. Randy John (Seneca) will contribute their academic and research skills as the writing team for the background and history of the Thomas Indian School for the exhibition.

Seneca artists Luanne Redeye, Randee Spruce and Tami Watt have produced artistic expressions to help tell our story as well.

Not only have academics and artists contributed to the project but the Hodinöshö:ni community has shown their full support. Haynes would like to extend gratitude to Mike General, President Matthew Pagels, Treasurer Ricky Armstrong, Seneca Nation Council and all the donations that have been received through the Go Fund Me campaign.

The effects the "Kill the Indian, save the man" Indian Boarding School era still has lasting effects our communities. The generational trauma has contributed to instability in families, drug and alcohol abuse, depression, suicide and sexual assault. Haynes hopes we can piece together some of the past and understand how to move forward, he shares "We are resilient, we hope that people face their internal conflicts and feel the emotions through the text and artistic expressions, it can lead to a path of healing. Facing an uncomfortable past is the first step to repairing our communities so we can move forward together."

Resources and information will be available for community members to find information on former students and family members as well.

### **Crouse voted in to the Salamanca City Central School District Board of Education**

On Tuesday September 14th, the Salamanca City Central School District's (SCCSD) Board of Education (BOE) unanimously voted in Jessica Crouse to the vacant seat of Dr. Meghan McCune. Ms. Crouse will serve the vacant seat until re-elections in May 2022.

Crouse joining the BOE marks the first time two Seneca members have been elected to the board simultaneously, a milestone for the Seneca community and students. In the past, Maxine Dollar served 5 years from 1999-2004 and Candace Miller served from 2004-2009.

Kerry John was recently voted in as the Vice President of the BOE in July 2021. John has been elected to the board twice and has served six and a half years. He initially joined the BOE in 2015 to play an active role in improving the education of SCCSD students and get the district on track to increase graduation rates and higher education success.

A Salamanca alumna, Crouse has strong ties to the community and

has continued her education at Vermont Law School, achieving a Master's of Food and Agricultural Law. As a parent, she is fully invested in her son's education at Seneca Intermediate and has held a seat as the Vice-Chair for the Title VI Indian Parent Committee since 2019. Crouse will continue to serve on the Seneca Nation's Climate Task Force, the Natural Resources Committee and as Executive Director for the Cannabis Regulatory Authority. She even has some teaching experience as an adjunct instructor at Jamestown Business College.

"I am deeply humbled and I believe with my experience, commitment, and community ties that I would serve in a manner will benefit our district. I look forward to working diligently with the present board members on ways to continue making our schools work the best," states Crouse.

Crouse intends to run for one of the two vacant seats next May in the BOE elections.

"Being present and active spans the tenets of lifelong learning. Our students and community become stronger in any avenue of educational pursuit when a solid foundation is built upon a balance of needs and wants. Don't be afraid to take that "first step!" shares Crouse.

John feels having two Senecas on the BOE is important as it reflects the 40% Indigenous student body in within the SCCSD K-12, electing another Seneca board member is more proportionate to the student population. This can help push initiatives that are important to the Indigenous students and community.

"It's time for our community to support our Seneca candidates. Please lend your support for Jessica next May at the BOE elections," says John.

Marie Watt, who resides in Portland, Oregon, is a citizen of the Seneca Nation and has German-Scots ancestry. Cannupa Hanska Luger, who is based in New Mexico, is a citizen of the Three Affiliated Tribes (Mandan, Hidatsa, Arikara) of Fort Berthold and has Lakota and European ancestry.

Emory students and Carlos Museum docents, patrons, and employees embroidered bandanas for the new, artist-guided community artwork, a collaborative project of both Watt and Luger. Watt is creating another new monumental sculpture in her *Blanket Stories* series for this exhibition and has asked for community participation.

Emory University was founded in 1836 on the historic lands of the Muscogee (Creek) people, 15 years after the First Treaty of Indian Springs (1821) through which the

> U.S. government acquired this area of land from the Muscogee Nation. After this treaty, many Muscogee people relocated to Alabama, and were then forcibly removed to present-day Oklahoma on the Trail of Tears in 1836. We share this acknowledgment of the history of the land to help put a better perspective on the Each/Other exhibition and Emory's commitment to honor Indigenous nations and peoples, both locally and beyond.

The Carlos Museum is honored to present this exhibition that centers Indigenous knowledge, creativity, and collaboration.

#### The Emergency Broadband Benefit ("EBB") to help households struggling during the pandemic



The Emergency Broadband Benefit ("EBB") is a temporary Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") program to help households struggling to afford internet service during the pandemic. This new benefit will connect children to school, seniors to telemedicine services, and New Yorkers to jobs and other vital services. The application period is open and is first-come, first-serve.

Eligible enrollees can receive a **credit up to \$50 monthly toward broadband service (or \$75 monthly for households on tribal lands)**. A **one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase an internet-accessible device** (laptop, desktop, tablet, etc.) from participating providers is also available.

#### The EBB has broad eligibility criteria. A household is eligible if it meets one of the following:

- Has an income at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines or participates in certain assistance programs, such as SNAP, Medicaid, Section 8 or Lifeline;
- Receives benefits under the federal free and reduced-price school lunch program or the school breakfast program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision in the 2019-2020 or 2020-2021 school year;
- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Experienced a substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since February 29, 2020 and the household had a total income in 2020 at or below \$99,000 for single filers and \$198,000 for joint filers; or
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing Lifeline, low-income or COVID-19 program.

The FCC has prepared an FAQ for consumers to learn more about the program.

#### The prognosis for a lingering pandemic

COVID-19 variants, booster shots and combating vaccine hesitancy

As we edge closer to entering the second year of the COVID-19 pandemic, we as a nation are facing a combination of factors that could lead to further public health disasters if not redressed.

Increases in vaccine hesitancy, refusals to participate in even the most basic of preventative protection measures such as wearing a mask and maintaining social distancing, along with the addition of political rhetoric and misinformation regarding COVID-19 and COVID-19 vaccines is a clear recipe for disaster. We are already witnessing the consequences within our Native communities.

Indian Country has been and continues to be disproportionately affected by COVID-19 infections, hospitalizations, deaths, chronic and generational health disparities, political factors and social influences regarding public health policy that has increased the disease burden within our communities.

One of these issues to be specifically concerned about in the potential spread of COVID-19 is the overwhelming housing shortage in Indian Country. This lack of housing has led to overcrowded homes, meaning we often have multiple generations of people living in a single shared space. This makes prevention incredibly difficult.

The prevalence of cardiovascular disease and diabetes is another main issue when it comes to the virus, as individuals with pre-existing conditions and those that are immunocompromised have a reduced ability to fight off infections and are at particular risk of suffering from severe infection, hospitalization, and mortality.

As roughly 45 percent of the population is unvaccinated,

and schools begin to re-open, there is cause for concern when sending our children back to class.

Children12 years of age and younger do not yet have authorization for vaccinations, increasing transmission risks among this group and to their family members. Sending our children back into an environment where we are unsure if the teachers have been vaccinated or if the school has mandated masks increases the possibility that they will not only be infected with the virus, but will bring it home with them to other generations of their family — particularly those in their family who may be more vulnerable to infection from the new variant.

With that said, what are the best ways we can protect ourselves, our children, and our community as the Delta variant spreads rapidly throughout the United States?

#### **Get vaccinated**

The Delta variant is rapidly spreading throughout the United States. It is more transmissible and appears to have a higher virulence (severity or harmfulness of infection) in vulnerable populations.

Our daily case rate went up to 876, and recently we have seen over 6,000 new cases of this Delta variant in Indian Country — similar statistics to those seen at the end of the last wave in the winter of 2020 — which is a serious cause for alarm.

The current vaccinations provided are very effective, affording full protection against infection to roughly 88.1 percent of vaccinated individuals, while just under 12 percent of vaccinated individuals will become infected with the COVID-19 Delta variant.

Of that 12 percent, the majority had a high enough viral load provided by the vaccination to reduce both infection severity and transmissibility, meaning the vaccine still offered protective benefits.

In short, COVID-19 vaccinations reduce the risk of being infected, reduce infection severity and mortality, and reduce the risk of transmitting the virus to someone else if you are infected.

#### Already vaccinated? Get a booster.

There is much debate surrounding whether or not individuals in the United States who are fully vaccinated should receive a third booster dose of the COVID-19 vaccine or whether resources should be allocated to vaccinate the global population.

I often equate this to the analogy of the oxygen masks

deploying during a turbulent flight emergency. We are taught not to put the oxygen mask on the vulnerable first — not on the children, not on the elderly, not on the physically disabled — but instead to put our own oxygen mask on first.

Once we have done that, we are in a much better position to assist others in need.

The same goes for vaccinations. We can't help others to the fullest extent of our capabilities if we are not healthy ourselves. Getting a booster not only continues your immunity — which is naturally lost over time in regards to COVID-19 as antibody production declines — but it also helps protect your family, your community and the population as a whole.

The global vaccination effort is another monumental undertaking, one in which the United States must be at the forefront. To do so, we must continue to establish higher levels of herd immunity and promote vaccination efforts, including the distribution of third booster doses. Currently, about 55 percent of the United States population is vaccinated, yet we are still seeing drastic increases in COVID-19 cases.

The pandemic is resurging, and if we had not established the vaccination rates we have attained presently, the situation could be much worse. To prevent these circumstances from escalating, it is imperative that we stop the spread of this virus. Stopping the spread reduces COVID-19's ability to mutate into another variant, making vaccinations critical for us to make an impact on the pandemic.

Wear a mask. Engage in social distancing. Reduce large gatherings. Clean your environment.

This pandemic is far from

over, and we have as a country really let up on many of the preventative precautions that have helped to keep us relatively safe.

U.S. politics, unfortunately, has gotten involved with this public health crisis. This is not a partisan issue, and political agendas should never be involved in establishing and maintaining the health and safety of our people and our children in the face of this pandemic.

Wear a mask, keep six feet of social distance between yourself and others, reduce the size of or postpone gatherings where a large number of guests are anticipated, and wash your hands.

These are all simple behavioral and social actions we can easily engage with daily to reduce the risk of infection and limit the transmission of COVID-19. Consideration, compassion and clemency are essential tools in the combat of COVID-19.

Protect yourself, your family and your community by practicing proper preventative protection measures as well as wearing and utilizing proper preventative protection equipment. Remember, by reducing transmission, we reduce the opportunities that this virus has to further mutate into a more infectious and deadly variant.

#### Vaccine hesitant? Let's talk shots.

A commonly asked question is, "Why should I get vaccinated if the COVID-19 infection has a 99 percent survival rate?" COVID-19 symptoms can persist for months, resulting in what is referred to as "long-haul" or "long-term" COVID.

The virus can damage the lungs, heart, kidney and brain, which increases the risk of long-term health problems. Even young, otherwise healthy individuals can feel unwell for weeks to months after infection.

Imaging tests taken months after recovery from COVID-19 have shown lasting damage to the heart muscle, even in people who experienced only mild COVID-19 symptoms, which may further increase the risk of heart failure or other heart complications in the future.

The type of pneumonia often associated with COVID-19 can cause long-standing damage to the tiny air sacs (alveoli) in the lungs and the resulting scar tissue can lead to long-term breathing problems.

The main binding site for the COVID-19 virus is the ACE2 protein, which is expressed in the kidney much more than in the lungs. Even in young individuals, COVID-19 infection can cause damage to the kidney, leading to an increased risk of acute kidney injury and renal complications later in life.

In severe COVID-19 infections, acute kidney injury is observed more frequently and often linked to increased risk of mortality. Even in young people, COVID-19 can cause strokes, seizures and Guillain-Barre syndrome — a condition that causes temporary paralysis.

COVID-19 infection may also increase the risk of developing

Parkinson's and Alzheimer's disease. Short-term side effects from vaccination and a roughly 80 percent effectiveness of preventing infection from COVID-19 variants, along with a nearly 95 percent effectiveness at preventing serious infection, hospitalization and mortality, far outweigh the risks of facing COVID-19 infection.

If you are unvaccinated, this further increases the risks of developing long-term health damages from this virus.

Additionally, the Pfizer mRNA COVID-19 vaccine has just received full FDA authorization and approval, meaning the public can be very confident that the vaccine meets the highest standards for safety, effectiveness, efficiency and manufacturing quality.

In summary, the vaccine benefits outweigh the known risks of contracting COVID-19 and developing the health complications currently being observed in and associated with those suffering from long-haul COVID.

**Native communities** 

While Native populations are at about a 50 percent vaccination rate, there is still much work to be done. Misinformation or promoting negative messages regarding vaccination rates in some areas of Indian Country has instilled a false sense of security in many of us, and negative messaging around the fact that both the Moderna and Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccines have yet to receive full FDA approval and authorization can be misleading to get people vaccinated.

We should be careful not to over-emphasize that currently these vaccines have been approved for emergency authorization use only. This is a true fact — but the way it is presented can be counterintuitive.

This can also damage our goal of combating this virus, reducing transmission rates, and preventing further mutation. It is vital for us to ensure messaging campaigns surrounding COVID-19 are positive, accurate and evidence-based, and encourage engagement in vaccination.

If you are unvaccinated, find a local vaccination clinic near you, make an appointment, and get your vaccine.

If you are vaccinated and have access to a vaccine booster, get the booster.

Regardless of vaccination status, continue to practice safety measures and prevention precautions such as masking and social distancing. If you're still hesitant, let's talk. I'm here to answer your questions and meet you where you currently are regarding vaccination status. After all, the only way we'll make it through this pandemic successfully is together.

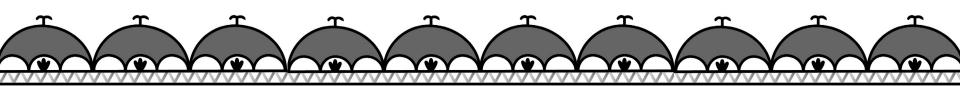

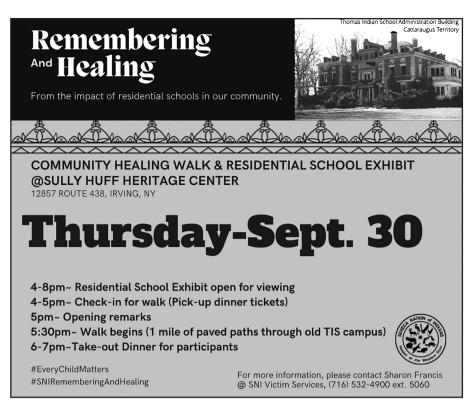

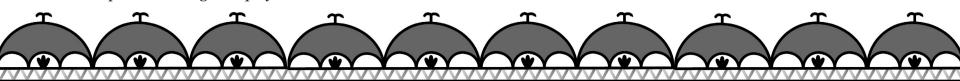
**Powerful Tools for Caregivers** is an educational series designed to provide you with the tools you need to take care of yourself.

It was another successful event with plenty of giveaways. The staff always enjoys the interaction with community members at this annual event. We hope to see everyone again at next year's fall festival!







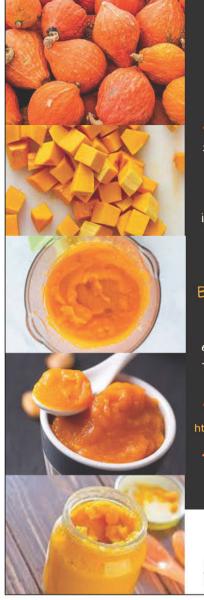












## Traditional Baby Food

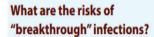




### COVID-19 Breakthrough Infections: What Community Members Need to Know

With the new and highly contagious Delta variant spreading across Indian Country, some vaccinated people have experienced breakthrough infections. Breakthrough infections are when someone fully vaccinated against COVID-19 gets infected and tests positive for COVID-19. **These infections are uncommon.** 

Below are answers to frequently asked questions about breakthrough infections.



There is a small chance someone could still get COVID-19 after being vaccinated. There are no vaccines that perfectly prevent 100% of infections. COVID-19 vaccines are highly effective at preventing severe illness and death.

If a vaccinated person does get a COVID-19 infection, there is a very low risk of severe illness or death. Most people with breakthrough cases experience mild symptoms and can recover at home. The vast majority of those hospitalized with COVID-19 are people who have not been vaccinated.

#### What is the point of vaccinating if people can still get sick?

Vaccinations can protect against disease and are highly protective against death and hospitalization due to COVID-19.

Breakthrough infections are rare. Even if you do have a breakthrough infection after being fully vaccinated, you may have mild symptoms or no symptoms at all.

Vaccination also reduces the risk of COVID-19 infections in our communities. When more people are vaccinated, it lowers the risk for everyone.





#### Why did guidance change again about vaccinated people wearing masks?

There is still a large portion of our population that is unvaccinated and at high risk for serious COVID-19 illness. Unfortunately, vaccinated people can still spread this variant to others, and that is why they need to wear a mask in public spaces.

Wearing a mask in public spaces will also help prevent future variants and will protect everyone in our community, including our elders, those with weaker immune systems, and children who are unable to get the vaccine.

#### What can I do?

- Get tested if you have symptoms of COVID-19, even if you are vaccinated
- Wear a mask in public spaces
- Meet up with friends and family outdoors
- · Avoid crowded spaces, especially indoor spaces

Encourage your friends, neighbors, coworkers, and family who are over age 12 and haven't gotten their COVID-19 vaccines to get vaccinated as soon as possible to protect our communities.

Well, let us tell you! The Prevention Team is a part of the community services within the Seneca Nation Health System, and our mission is to reduce substance use and suicide risk among Seneca Nation

youth and families through the creation of community-wide and culturally relevant programming. Our goal is to encourage youth to honor their journey through a substance free and healthy lifestyle. We do this by providing education to the community, especially the youth, on topics like mental health, substance use, and life skills. The team also provides suicide intervention trainings to the community.

Our program hosts monthly events that focuses on promoting families spending time together, as positive family engagement serves as a protective factor against substance misuse and suicide. We also have our Clubhouses, which will soon

have their doors open to youth ages 12-17, providing a safe place for youth to hang out or participate in a variety of prevention programming. The Clubhouses have a wide array of different amenities to offer the youth that include computers and quiet areas to work on their homework, a gaming room, rock wall, and an entertainment area to enjoy movies with friends.

We love bringing education and awareness to the community, and we hope to see you at one of our future events and participating in our programming!

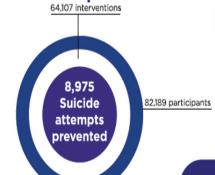
