A message from President Matthew B. Pagels

I hope you all had an enjoyable time with family and friends over the Thanksgiving holiday. We move quickly into Christmas and New Year's. Please be vigilant as you venture out into the surrounding communities to shop and enjoy holiday parties.

Covid – 19 continues to gain momentum as a new omicron variant was discovered in South Africa. There is concern this new variant may be more transmittable than the Delta variant. Researchers are conducting studies to determine transmission and severity once infected by the virus. According to medical experts we are better equipped to fight the spread of the new variant by following strict covid-19 protocols: sanitizing, social distancing and wearing face masks. The ultimate tool to fighting the spread is getting vaccinated as well as the booster shot.

Testing is also a deterrent to the spread of the virus. Free testing is now available at the fire halls in both Allegany and Cattaraugus 7 days a week from 3pm – 7pm. This includes Rapid Tests, with results available in as little as 10 minutes, and PCR tests, with results available in 24-36 hours. This testing is open to everyone, and appointments and insurance are not required. Some great news for the Department of Education. They were awarded the American Rescue Plan Grant sponsored by American Indian Resilience in Education program, the grant supports education and cultural literacy programs with an award of \$482,172 for three years. This is an excellent opportunity to expand language preservation and connect it to student success entering and graduating from postsecondary programs.

Lastly, the Seneca Nation observed the 173rd Birthday or recognition of our constitutional

FROM THE DESK OF THE TREASURER



Greetings,

I keep hearing we're supposed to have a mild winter. Then, I'll talk to someone else and they say we're supposed to have a fierce winter this year. Maybe it will end up being in between, since we already had some snow - then it all melted! Whatever happens, we know we'll be having winter weather very soon.

This is an especially busy time of year for our Fiscal Department. Right after finalizing all of the Nation's budgets each fall, they switch gears and go right into a variety of year-end closeout procedures and preliminary reporting. In addition, this is also the time of year for long-term financial forecasting of our governmental funds, investment portfolios and subsidiary entities. They continue to work on transition with the Housing Department and the new LLC's, SG&E and our Seneca One Stop enterprises, which are vital contributors to our nation's economic position. The Fiscal Department is also supporting the IT Department on the document management project; as is it a goal for the Nation's fiscal processing forms to be sent over electronically to the Fiscal Department. Operating any financial system includes processing payment documents such as purchase orders, paying invoices and producing electronic and paper checks. The most tedious paperwork processing can be accomplished quicker and more efficiently through digital submission

of the forms and we are working to move in this direction. Our weekly check processing substantially increases at this time of year and our Fiscal Department makes sure to meet each and every deadline. Our Fiscal Department is also responsible for managing federal funds received from the CARES ACT; and the ARPA funds; which each have strict distribution and reporting guidelines.

This COVID-19 pandemic, with all of its accompanied variety of strains, seems to be a never-ending plague; but I know that there will eventually be a return to "normal" - at some point in the future. My hope is that all of us in our communities can pull together and do our part to help prevent any further spread and stand united in this battle. Please take advantage of all the testing opportunities provided by Seneca Nation, as well as the vaccination clinics established for booster shots at both of our health centers.

CONTINUANCE OF WAIVER FOR IN-PERSON ENROLLMENT APPEARANCE

MOTION: by Arlene Bova, seconded by Angela Kennedy, that the Seneca Nation Council approves the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Seneca Nation is responsible for the health, safety and well-being of our members and is taking precautions to reduce the potential impact of COVID-19 on our community; and

WHEREAS, due to safety concerns, the Nation Council waived the in-person enrollment appearance requirement per the enrollment ordinance as amended on March 12, 2016 (CN: R-03-12-16-06), effective March 14, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on July 10, 2021 Council reinstated the in-person enrollment appearance requirement (CN: R-07-10-21-06); and

WHEREAS, recent increases in the rate of infection of COVID-19 both within and outside of the Seneca Nation Territory have made it unsafe to require in-person enrollment appearances at this time; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Seneca Nation Council hereby rescinds the July 10, 2021 resolution (CN: R-07-10-21-06) and continues to waive the in-person enrollment appearance requirement until reinstated by Council Resolution.

The Seneca Nation of Indians is seeking interested individuals to submit their qualifications to serve as a member of the Management Committee of Seneca Holdings, LLC. The company's Management Committee currently has **one** seat up for appointment.

Pursuant to the Charter adopted by the Nation's Council, every Management Committee member shall meet the following minimum qualifications:

- must be at least 21 years of age
- must have earned at least a high school diploma or equivalent
- have not been convicted of a felony, or other crime involving dishonesty, fraud, or otherwise involves a financial component (including, but not limited to, embezzlement or theft)
- provide information and submit to such background checks as necessary to ensure continued compliance with Federal disadvantaged business certification(s), security clearances and/or licenses as are from time to time held by the Company or its respective subsidiaries or management as part of its ongoing business operations.

Seneca Gaming Corporation, Niagara County Partner To Host Covid-19 Vaccine Clinics At Seneca Niagara Resort & Casino December 7 And 28

Online registration available through Niagara County Department of Health

NIAGARA FALLS, NEW YORK: (December 3, 2021) As Western New York continues to experience a rise in the number of positive cases of COVID-19, Seneca Gaming Corporation and Niagara County are teaming together to make vaccines easily accessible for area residents.

The corporation and the County announced that Seneca Niagara Resort & Casino will host vaccination clinics on Tuesday, December 7, and Tuesday, December 28, from 2-6 p.m. The clinics will be conducted in the resort's Hawk meeting room, located near the hotel lobby.

On December 7, County personnel will be providing first dose and booster shots of the Pfizer vaccine for eligible individuals age 5 and older; first dose and booster shots of the singe-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine for eligible individuals 18 and older; and booster doses only of the Moderna vaccine for eligible individuals age 18 and older. The December 28 clinic will offer only second doses of the Pfizer vaccine along with booster shots of the Pfizer, Johnson & Johnson and Moderna vaccines.

"We want everyone to be safe and healthy, especially at this time of year, when families and friends are gathering for the holidays," said Seneca Nation President Matthew Pagels. "We have battled the COVID pandemic as one greater Western New York community for nearly two years, and we need to continue to work together to keep our communities safe. We're happy to work with our neighbors to reach as many people as possible."

"Getting vaccinated is far and away the best thing people can do to

protect themselves and their families from COVID-19, especially as we head into the holiday season," said Daniel J. Stapleton, Director of the Niagara County Department of Health. "My team is committed to doing all we can to make vaccines easily available and that is why we are happy to partner with the Seneca Gaming Corporation to host these two clinics. Remember, a vaccine reduces the chance you will get COVID-19, but perhaps more importantly, if you do contract it, it lessens the symptoms and makes it far less likely you will end up hospitalized."

Registration is required to attend the clinics and can be completed online at the Niagara County Department of Health website https://www.niagaracounty.com/health.

The vaccine clinics at Seneca Niagara Resort & Casino are just the latest collaborative effort between the Seneca Nation, Seneca Gaming Corporation and local health officials to aid in the vaccination effort. The corporation has worked with Cattaraugus County to host a number of vaccination clinics inside the Seneca Allegany Events Center at Seneca Allegany Resort & Casino over the last several months.

"Our facilities are important cornerstones in our local community," said Seneca Gaming Corporation President & CEO Kevin Nephew. "Thousands of team members and visitors come to our properties every day. What better reason to visit than to help keep yourself, your family and your neighbors safe? 

The 27-year-old has played for five different organizations during his pro stint — including both Rochester franchises. Let's quickly go through his stops.


Following a seven-game run with the Swarm, Brown was released before signing with Rochester to finish out to 2017-



With the Big 30 committee back in place (since COVID-19 derailed life as we knew it), they returned to choosing the traditional 30-player unit, representing both NY and PA—actually that number was 31, the first time it's ever been that figure without a kicker due to there being a voting deadlock for the final spot. They were able to hand awards out in person for the first time since November of 2019.

The fourth major award-winner, aside from Coach, Player and Defensive Player of the Year, was Salamanca's Kody Shinners, who was named the E.B. Fitzpatrick/James Russell Memorial Award winner as the Lineman of the Year. He's the first Warriors lineman to win it since Jeremy John in 1992.

He was the choice among a group of finalists that included Pioneer's Alex Coder and Jasiah Jarocinski and Bolivar-Richburg's Trent Sibble.

"KODY has kind of been the face of our identity the last few years," Salamanca coach Chad Bartoszek said of the 6-foot, 250-pound senior. "He's really matured over the course of his career here. He became a leader, a captain, he hasn't missed practice in the three years I've been here, so he's kind of become a part of our identity, and it's going to be hard to lose him."

"His (presence) along with a few other of our big kids has kind of made us who we've been: Just big, tough, physical up front and we've really controlled the line of scrimmage for two seasons now, really making things tricky for opposing offenses, and our run game saw the benefits this year offensively with a 1,000-yard rusher in Jesse Stahlman."

Kody is the son of Jeanette and Jerry Shinners.

Hemphill became Buffalo's 28th 1,000 point scorer, recording the historic bucket on an offensive rebound putback at the 3:04 mark of the first quarter.

"I'm so proud of Summer," said head coach Felisha Legette-Jack. "Summer is an exceptional athlete who has really paid her dues to get healthy and get back out there and give herself to this team. Her energy was so contagious for people to feed off of her, but they never came and that was disappointing to see that. I'm just so proud to see her reach these milestones. Her game will only get better and we are going to try to get this team better as well."

The Buffalo, NY native led the Bulls with a career-high 26 points to go along with 12 rebounds, two assists, a steal and a block. Senior forward Adebola Adeyeye also had a double-double with 12 points and 13 rebounds, just one off her career-high. Also scoring in double figures was junior forward Loren Christie who had 11 points to go with five rebounds.

After a slow start to the game for both teams, Dyaisha Fair found Adeyeye with a great pass for the first basket of the



game. She continued to dish out dimes as she hit Hemphill for a transition bucket and later knocked down a spot up three to cut the Sooners lead to 9-7 at the first media timeout. A three from Hemphill out of the timeout would give the Bulls the lead and on the next possession she got an offensive rebound putback for her 1,000th career point. Hemphill would continue to heat up as she knocked down another triple and Fair followed with a jumper to give the Bulls a 17-15 lead as UB held the Sooners scoreless for the final two minutes of the quarter.

Hemphill continued to attack as she scored the first four points

of the second quarter and later, Christie was fouled on a threepoint attempt and converted all three free throws to give UB a 24-17 lead at the 7:06 mark but Oklahoma would answer with an 11-0 run to take a 28-24 lead at the media timeout. The Bulls offense would continue to stall, and the Sooners capitalized as they extended their run to 19-2 to take a double-digit lead before Adeyeye converted on a pair of baskets and Hemphill found Christie on the block with a great pass to trim the lead to 39-32, but the Sooners rattled off a 7-0 run in just over a minute to take a 46-33 lead at the break.

The Bulls offense found its rhythm to start the third quarter as Hemphill, Adeyeye and Fair scored on three consecutive possessions to cut the lead to 51-39 but the Sooners answered with back-toback threes to extend their lead to 56-39 and force a UB timeout at the 6:51 mark. Oklahoma continued their hot shooting from beyond the arc as they used a 6-o run in just over a minute to take a 62-41 lead at the media timeout. Hemphill continued to assert herself as she knocked down back-to-back jumpers to cut the lead to 68-54 but the Sooners scored at the buzzer to go up 70-54 at the end of the third.

The two teams traded baskets early in the fourth quarter before Jazmine Young knocked down a triple to trim the lead to 20 but Oklahoma responded with back-to-back second chance layups to take an 85-61 lead with 4:54 remaining. Junior Nia Jordan connected on a mid-range baseline jumper to end a four-plus minute scoring drought and cut the lead to 89-65 but that would be as close as the Bulls would get.

The Bulls evened up with the Sooners on the glass with 53 rebounds each and scored 34 points in the paint, but Oklahoma turned 14 UB turnovers into 19 points. The Sooners made 15 three pointers on the game and shot 41% from the floor and 37% from behind the arc.


Warriors earn four spots on C South first-team all-stars

Jesse Stahlman and senior offensive lineman Tre Turner made the C South first-team offense, while senior defensive lineman **Kody Shinners** and senior defensive back Cole Hedlund made the first-team defense. Stahlman led the Warriors' rushing attack with 1,044 yards (10 touchdowns), 108 receiving yards and one touchdown pass. Turner was a fouryear starter and a key leader as a captain this year. Shinners was a disruptive force on the line, making 59 tackles with eight sacks. Hedlund was the team's leading receiver (375 yards, six touchdowns)

and had multiple interceptions at cornerback.

Also for the Warriors, junior defensive lineman Jaxon Tarr, senior linebacker Shawn Pierce and senior defensive back Harley Hoag made the second-team defense. Senior Eion Quigley and junior Zaron Tucker were honorable mentions.

The league's top honors went to Fredonia seniors Nick Whitfield and Matt Lotter and Southwestern senior Aidan Kennedy. Whitfield won the League Player of the Year, tallying 1,797 passing yards (16 touchdowns), 720 rushing yards (13 touchdowns) along with 32 tackles, two sacks and four interceptions. Kennedy won Offensive Player of the Year after marking 1,717 passing yards (17 touchdowns) and 606 rushing yards (14 touchdowns). Lotter was the Defensive Player of the Year with 140 total tackles (four for loss), three sacks, one interception and three forced fumbles.

Gowanda won the team sportsmanship award and the Panthers' Ben Krakewski won the individual league sportsmanship award.

Former Media Director joins University At Buffalo as instructor for developing Indigenous Studies Program

The University of Buffalo, College of Arts and Sciences is the recipient \$3.174 million from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation in support of the new Department of Indigenous Studies.

Based on years of workshops, discussions, and meetings with the university's Indigenous faculty, students, staff, alumni and community, the Department of Indigenous Studies will offer Indigenous languages, education on environmental impacts/issues on Indigenous lands, the health and well-being of Indigenous communities, and relationships between government and policy on Indigenous nation's laws.

The Department of Indigenous Studies has two Seneca members on staff as instructors.

Dr. Jason Corwin, former Executive Director of the Seneca Media and Communications Center (SMCC), has joined the Department of Indigenous Studies as a Clinical Assistant Professor of Indigenous Studies. Dr. Corwin helped launch the SMCC in 2015 after he received a doctorate in Environmental Studies from Cornell. Dr. Corwin was a key figure in social media expansion, producing videos based on Seneca issues, and served on the Water Task Force that successfully halted a waste water treatment facility that would have had dire effects on the water quality of Ohi:yo'.

Dr. Corwin is excited to embark on his new career path, he is teaching two classes this semester so he can aide in developing the new department and program as it transitions from American Studies to Indigenous Studies. Eventually Dr. Corwin will teach three separate classes within the new major that encompasses many diverse tracks.

This fall, his Environmental Studies class will entail hands on learning including field trips to locate herbal medicines, nature preserves, exploring the waterways of Buffalo, and visits to the Tonawanda reservation and community. Environmental impacts, customs and traditions within Seneca Territories and communities will be a focus for his students as well. Dr. Corwin will lecture on the history of the Kinzua Dam- constructed in the 1960s, it flooded 10,000 acres of prime farm land and forcibly removed hundreds of Seneca families from their ancestral homes, Defending Ohi:yo'- a environmentalist panel of Seneca Nation members and citizens of Coudersport, PA that shut down an impending waste water treatment plant, and the significance and medicinal uses of maple and sweet grass to Hodinöhshöni' nations.

Dr. Corwin's other fall session is titled Teaching Indian Image on Film, a class developed by the late Barry White, a former lecturer at UB and inspiration for many former students and staff including Dr. Corwin himself. The class has a reputation for being favored by students and Corwin intends to keep the momentum. Students are thus far very engaged and the classroom discussion often leads to deep topics concerning "white savior narrative" in mainstream films and society. The student base is diverse, young and eager to learn while always pushing for more insight. He intends

to engage students into global history with films either produced by an Indigenous creator or portrayed with a strong Indigenous lead or cast. Films concerning Indigenous political movements like the American Indian Movement, Red Power, and Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women

will give perspective for all.
Dr. Marilyn Schindler, who
earned a doctorate in American
Studies from UB and lectured
the self-titled "Savage Woman"
class in the 1970s, will lend her
Seneca language knowledge and
skill to both students attending
UB classes and at home on the
Cattaraugus Territory where
she intends to continue her
passion of lifelong learning
and instructing. A self-taught
speaker, Dr. Schindler was

soon teaching in an effort to save the Seneca language from extinction while balancing her education and work with the Seneca Nation. "I have an obligation to the Newtown Long House on the Seneca Nation to continue my work there- and that's what I'm going to do," shares Dr. Schindler.

> Dr. Schindler has been an influential instructor, student and colleague at the university for decades.

"UB is taking the lead with the new Department of Indigenous Studies, but there should be similar departments in colleges and universities across the state and across the country," says Schindler. "The interest

was there in the 1970s when our classes were full, and I'm starting to hear some political leaders speak about Indigenous rights and say that no history of North America is complete that focuses only on European influence."

NASA's asteroid-slamming mission will test new ion drive system - By Rahul Rao | space.com

NASA's mission DART will test our ability to redirect an asteroid by quite literally crashing into it — but the spacecraft will also test a new type of propulsion system for the agency.

NASA's Evolutionary Xenon Thruster-Commercial (NEXT-C) is an ion drive. Rather than igniting hydrogen-based propellant as most rockets do, NEXT-C will use the electricity generated by the spacecraft's own solar panels to create an electrical field that accelerates charged xenon ions up to very high speeds in order to propel the craft. Ion drives can, in theory, reach much higher speeds than conventional rockets. NASA's Glenn Research Center in Cleveland, Ohio, and the company Aerojet Rocketdyne teamed up to build the NEXT-C system, and a mission called the Double Asteroid Redirection Test (DART) will be its testbed.

DART will launch from Vandenberg Space Force Base in California aboard a SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket on Wednesday (Nov. 24) at 1:58 a.m. EST (0658 GMT, or Nov. 23 at 10:58 p.m. local time). Next autumn, the spacecraft will crash into the smaller asteroid of a pair called Didymos, called Dimorphos, so that scientists can measure how dramatically such an impact might change an asteroid's orbit should a space rock ever threaten Earth. Launch coverage will begin at 12:30 a.m. EST (0530 GMT)

Even more significant is that the Lead **Propulsion Engineer is the Seneca** Nation's own Jeremy John (Turtle Clan), of the Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Lab. Jeremy is the son of the late Lionel R. and Lorraine Judith John. When asked about the mission, Jeremy's brother Kerry John, Deputy Chief of Staff S.N.I. said "Jeremy is showing the entire planet what can be accomplished when you focus your sights on goals that seem so far out of reach; walking a path that few ever even think of, let alone actually consider; and ever so quietly doing something that might just be one of the greatest achievements the world has ever known."

here at Space.com and on NASA TV.

But before the mission's dramatic end, DART will use NEXT-C, testing the system in space for the first time. An ion drive was previously used on NASA's Deep Space 1 and Dawn spacecraft, which launched in 1998 and 2007, but NEXT-C will be three times as powerful, according to NASA.

"It is a little bittersweet to know that we are only going to be able to operate for a short amount of time before we impact the asteroid," Jeremy John, lead propulsion engineer for DART, and an engineer for Johns Hopkins University Advanced Physics Laboratory (JHUAPL), said in a

video.

NEXT-C won't be the main force pushing DART along its journey;

that duty will fall to the 12 conventional thrusters aboard the spacecraft that will be responsible for much of the spacecraft's movements, including in the final leg of its journey as it plunges into Dimorphos.

But NEXT-C will light up several times along DART's journey. The intent of the maneuvers, according to NEXT-C's creators, is to take the ion drive for a test spin. Its engineers will turn the system on to show that the ion drive can run with just the power generated by the spacecraft's solar panels — and to show that it works in the harsh conditions of space.

"And we're going to just basically demonstrate that we can operate it, in space, because part of the wonders of new technology is just that step from when you built it up to getting it to space and getting it to operate for the first time," Elena Adams, an engineer at JHUAPL and DART's deputy project manager, said during a news conference held Nov. 4. "So that's what we're demonstrating for NASA."

Sour Cream Christmas Cookies Recipe

"I've been making this cookie recipe for 40 years. The recipe came from my mother Martha Bucktooth's cookbook. I enjoy making these cookies and people call me every year for this Christmas cookie

recipe. I don't have the cookbook anymore but still have the recipe.

Keeping the recipe alive was tough. We wrote it down several times. It's like another recipe... a chocolate cake I made when I was13 and my father loved it. It had buttermilk and strong black coffee and it looked like water when you got it all mixed up. Then you baked it and it was the thickest, darkest cake you have ever had. I had lost the recipe at one point and I finally found it again.

I gave this cookie recipe to all my kids. I made them each a recipe book with our favorite family recipes and they have notes at the bottom like who used to make it and where it came from. So all of these recipes came from family. In different ways. They've created a lot of memories. And they make everyone happy. So I enjoy cooking them and sharing them."

Cookie recipe below:

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees.

Mix dry ingredients:

- 6-7 cups flour
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt

Cream together:

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla



Add dry ingredients to creamed mixture, alternating with 2 cups of sour cream.

Chill dough and roll out. Cut with cookie cutters and bake for 10-12 minutes. Decorate with your favorite frosting.



We asked what he likes to do in his spare time. He says, "I like to hang with family, friends and also go four-wheeling."


Favorite quote or words/advice that he lives by? He says, "Sometimes you will never know the value of a moment until it becomes a memory."


Sug also says, "I am a very emotional person, I also love animals and love to be in the woods." And he adds "Go Bills!"

When someone is quarantined, that doesn't mean they are infected. Quarantines are meant to restrict the movement of people who may have been exposed but haven't tested positive. The CDC recommends 10 days to see whether symptoms develop (fever, dry cough, and difficulty breathing). It is recommended that you stay in your bedroom, use a separate bathroom if possible, wear a face mask around others, and don't share dishes, towels or bedding.

OUARANTINE VS. ISOLATION

- Isolation: separates sick people with a contagious disease from people who are not sick.
- · Quarantine: separates and restricts the movement of disease to see if they become sick

IN CASE OF QUARANTINE **BE SURE TO HAVE:**

- Food With Long Storage Life Canned goods (beans), frozen food (vegetables), pasta, rice, dried fruits/vegetables peanut butter, nuts and oatmeal.
- The CDC suggests you have plenty of fluids on hand, such as bottled water, Pedialyte or

 - Have a 10-day supply of any prescription medications for those in your home pain relievers, antacids, cough and cold
- Other Supplies feminine supplies, diapers, and laundry detergent as well as cleaning and disinfecting
